SOMEONE SAID IT WAS 94 degrees in the shade, so it is conceivable that it was more than 100 degrees at the sun-drenched distance casting field at Dundee, Michigan. Most of the casters who competed in the 97th American Casting Association National Tournament, August 1 –6, 2005, grumbled occasionally about the heat, but their focus was definitely on making that long cast or hitting a target. After all, this was the Nationals: The *Super Bowl* of casting. Well, at least the most important casting event in North America.

Here are some of the highlights in the various events.

FLY DISTANCE EVENTS

ONE-HAND FLY DISTANCE EVENT: Most consider the One-Hand Fly Distance Event the most demanding and challenging of all the casting disciplines. You have five minutes to make your casts and the longest cast determines the winner. The second longest is also recorded in case of a tie.

HIGHLIGHTS: Rene Gillibert cast 200 feet. Henry Mittel topped that by one foot. Then Steve Rajeff stepped into the caster's box. His line folded back and forth in very narrow loops, gaining speed and elevation, and then coupled with perfect timing, Steve launched an amazing 223-foot cast to win the Gold.

But the real story involves two young casters who placed 5th and 8th. Bobby McGraw is a tall, lanky 19-year old who has been practicing distance and accuracy casting for a few weeks only. He threw a fly 173 feet to capture 5th place in the highly competitive Men's Division, while Rob Kolakowski's 167-foot cast earned him 8th place. He, too, has been practicing for only a short period of time. "If those two fellows continue to practice, they could represent USA in the world tournament

some day,” according to John Seroczynski. Bob Nasby and Vic Mason recently started the St. Paul Casting Club in Minnesota. Robby and Bob are members. In fact, right now, this quartet of anglers represents the club’s total membership. But they will grow and grow.

ANGLER’S FLY DISTANCE EVENT: This is similar to the One-Hand Event, except that much lighter tackle is used here. The shooting head is equivalent to a No. 10/11 line. Most casters use mono for the shooting line (it must be .015” or heavier).

HIGHLIGHTS: Jay Clark, who has been cast-

ing competitively for about four years made a phenomenal 189-ft. cast to win this event. Henry Mittel’s 193-ft. cast, would have been the new record (190 feet, held jointly by Steve Rajeff and Rene Mittel), but his leader was ¾-inch short which disqualified his cast. According to the rules, the leader must be 9- to 12-feet long. Actually, a longer leader than what Henry used would have been to his advantage because of the breeze. It probably won’t be long before someone casts 200 feet in the Angler’s Fly Distance.

“Cajun” Bill Clements, casting in the Senior Division, said that the Angler’s Fly Distance was his weakest event. *Yeah, right.* Result? Cajun Bill made a cast of 166 feet, which not only was long enough to win the event, but he also set a new record for the Seniors. The previous record, 164 feet, was held by Tom Gong, who loaned his rod to Clements for this event. This is just another example of the high degree of sportsmanship that exists in competitive casting. Simply stated, casters help each other. Tom Gong came in second and Tony Yap won the Bronze.

In the Ladies Division Alice Gillibert, Pam Peters and Nicole Kozicki won the Gold, Silver and Bronze medals.

But what was very impressive is the progress made by George Revel, his brother Dusty and Andy Tulgetske (they finished in that order) in this distance event. They all cast very well and

George threw a 154-ft. cast for a new National Record in the Intermediate Division. Remarkable! All three will undoubtedly be future champs.

TWO-HAND FLY DISTANCE EVENT: The Two-Handed Fly Distance is similar to Spey casting only the tackle is considerably heavier. And that's an understatement.

HIGHLIGHT: Steve Rajeff beat Henry Mittel by a single foot with his cast of 275 feet.

PLUG DISTANCE EVENTS

TWO-HAND REVOLVING SPOOL: This is not an easy event. It requires considerable coordination, a "jazzed-up reel," a long rod, and, hopefully a favorable wind.

HIGHLIGHTS: Henry Mittel established a Men's ACA record with his 352-ft. cast beating Steve Rajeff and Jay Clark (they both cast 349 feet).

Bill Clements cast 305 feet to set a Senior National record, followed by Dick Fujita's 296-ft cast and Zack Willson's 292-ft. throw.

Pam Peters cast 261 ft. for a Women's ACA record.

Amazingly, records were set in all three divisions. (*Aside to reel manufacturers who are interested in extreme distance:* You might want to attend these tournaments and visit with the casters to learn why and how they are achieving these distances).

TWO-HAND SPIN DISTANCE EVENT: An interesting event that relies heavily on coordination, equipment and skill.

HIGHLIGHTS: Jay Clark cast 379 feet to win the Gold. Steve Rajeff cast 376 feet and Henry Mittel long cast measured out at 375 feet.

Canadian Gord Deval won the Gold in the Seniors with 334 feet, which Gus Beushausen threw 326 feet and Bill Clements also cast 326.

Pam Peters, who had a very good tournament, cast 310 feet.

1/4-OZ. SPIN DISTANCE EVENT--ONE HAND:

It amazes me how casters are able to attain these tremendous distances. (To put this in perspective, a 1/4-oz. plug weighs about the same as 1-1/2 sheets of letterhead paper.)

HIGHLIGHTS: George Revel set a National ACA Intermediate Division record with his long cast of

213 feet. Pam Peters, cast 225 feet for a Women's ACA National Record. *And the beat goes on.*

FLY ACCURACY EVENTS:

BASS BUG EVENT: A favorite among spectators and casters because it's fast moving. Among the disciplines one must cast to a 50-ft. target, lift up, make a single false cast and then deliver the air-resistant bass bug into a 30-inch target that's 65 to 70 feet away. Not easy!

HIGHLIGHT: Steve Rajeff shot a perfect score (100) in the challenging Bass Bug event. To illustrate how difficult this event is, only three other casters had shot a perfect score in this event at a National. *Steve Rajeff now is the only man to have shot a perfect score in all six plug and fly accuracy games in National competition.*

There was also excitement in the Senior Division Bass Bug when the venerable Zack Willson shot a 98 for a new National ACA record. Previous holder? Zack Willson with a 97. Young Andy Tulgetske won the Intermediate with a 91.

THE TROUT FLY EVENT: This discipline encompasses three types of casting: Dry Fly, Wet Fly and Roll Casting.

HIGHLIGHTS: Nothing unusual. Henry Mittel,

David Roberts and Chris Korich won the Men's Division in that order; Tony Yap, Ed Lanser and Bill VanNatter won the Senior's; Pam Peters, Elaine Gong and Nicole Kozicki earned the medals in the Women's Division.

THE DRY FLY EVENT: This is the classic fly event, although some claim it should be speeded up (time limit is 8 minutes to cast ten targets).

HIGHLIGHTS: In the Dry Fly Event, Rene Gillibert and Steve Rajeff tied with 98s, which required a shoot-off. Again they shot a 98. Another shoot-off. Rene cast a 99 to Steve's 98 to capture the Gold. Chris Korich earned the Bronze.

PLUG ACCURACY EVENTS

Visibility was very poor for most of the accuracy events especially in the plug disciplines. Nonetheless, some amazing scores were made.

1/4 OZ. SPIN ACCURACY EVENT

HIGHLIGHTS: Chris Korich shot a perfect score (100), which ties previous ACA National Records. Henry Mittel missed only one target for a 99.

In the Senior Division, Zack Willson set a record with a 98 beating his previous record of 97.

3/8 OZ. ACCURACY EVENT

HIGHLIGHTS: Steve Rajeff and Harvey Beck both shot a 98 (Steve won the shoot-off), but the “big story” took place in the Senior. Division. Bobby Spear cast a 99, a new ACA National Senior record. Previous record holders were Bobby and Zack Willson with 97s. Here’s what’s unique: *When Bobby was only 18, he shot a 99 in the National, and he repeated this score exactly 50 years later, now casting as a Senior!*

5/8 OZ. ACCURACY EVENT

HIGHLIGHTS: Chris Korich won this with a 98 but the interesting scenario was what took place for the Silver. Jim Seroczynski tied B. L. Farley with a 97. What’s unique is that Jim never practices (except at an occasional tournament) since he spends most of his spare time fishing. B.L. won the shoot-off and the Silver and Jim earned a Bronze Medal.

Other awards and honors:

ANGLER’S ALL AROUND CHAMPION: Steve Rajeff.

GRAND ALL AROUND CHAMPION: Steve Rajeff.

ALL AMERICAN TEAM: Steve Rajeff, Henry Mittel, Chris Korich, Rene Gillibert, Jay Clark, Tony Yap and Harvey Beck.

THE 2006 ACA NATIONAL TOURNAMENT will be hosted by the Long Beach Casting Club (California). The dates are July 31 - August 5.

This venerable casting club certainly has ample experience in sponsoring major tournaments. It hosted the ACA Nationals in 1947, 1954, 1961, 1971, 1978, 1984 and 2000!

Located in scenic Recreation Park at 7th Street and Federation Drive in Long Beach, LBCC has its own clubhouse and a 130' X 255' oval casting pool. Thus, no matter what wind direction, targets can be placed to give the casters the best possible advantage.

The clubhouse features a rustic knotty pine interior, which provides the perfect backdrop for the mounted fish, trophies, flies and interesting memorabilia.

LBCC has a rich angling and casting history that dates back to 1925 when it was founded by David R. Linder.

While casting, of course, is heavily featured, the club's activities include a mixture of fly-tying, rod building, organized fishing trips, advanced fly-fishing techniques and conservation. Nationally-known speakers are invited to share their knowledge at club meetings.

LBCC hosts the popular Southwestern Casting Tournament every year.



The special location of the Long Beach Casting Club is favored not only by casters, but also by non-casting family members and friends, because of the almost unlimited sight-seeing opportunities. One can visit Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, Six Flags, Universal Studios, live theater or music concerts. There are excellent world-class restaurants and numerous museums, cruises and other nearby sight-seeing opportunities.

Mark Lipe, who is the tournament captain for this National, has made arrangements with the Guesthouse Hotel. The rate is a very reasonable

\$73 per night and this includes a complimentary breakfast and area shuttle.

Reservations can be made via the hotel's toll-free number (800.990.9991) but be sure to ask for the special rate for the ACA participants.

Mark explains that the distance field is convenient and just a few miles away. Transportation to and fro will not be a problem. Again, the Long Beach Casting Club has had many years of hosting accuracy and distance casting.

It will be a "winner."
